

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### 41. Historical Background and Role in the Town or City's Development:

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery is located within the center of Center Harbor Village in the Town of Center Harbor. Center Harbor Village, however, was not the original municipal center of the rural community. The first primary village was located on a hilltop to the west, along what is now NH Route 25B/Dane Road. As the pastoral economy of the community shifted to tourism associated with Lake Winnipesaukee, the town center was moved down the hill to the present location at the shore of the lake. It was in the context of this shift that the Lake View cemetery was established.

The Ossipee tribe of the Sokoki nation lived on the northeast shores of Lake Winnipesaukee, and the Penacook confederacy had several villages on the southwest sides of the lake prior to the European settlement of the Lakes Region after the close of the French and Indian Wars.<sup>1</sup> In response to the European exploration of the region, these native people began to withdraw to the north by the mid-1670s.

As early as October of 1763, surveyors Moses Senter (1735-1815) and John Bean (174-1836) are said to have visited the area that would become Center Harbor from Londonderry. "Senter built a log house on the shore [near what is now the Garnet Hill Farm/34 Dewpoint Lane] with plans to return with his family the following summer." In June of 1764, Senter returned with his wife and son Sam. After the Revolutionary War, Moses Senter constructed a new house on Garnet Hill, on the south side of what is now Old Meredith/Coe Hill Road. Bean also settled in the area in ca. 1764, on land near what is now the Bean Cemetery (262 Bean Road), just over the line in Moultonborough.

In the next few years, the area was surveyed and the Governor of New Hampshire began to grant townships to early settlers. Gov. Benning Wentworth granted the charter for Moultonboro/Moultonborough in 1763,<sup>3</sup> the same year that Senter and Bean settled. Soon it was discovered that an oddly-shaped section of land had been overlooked when Moultonboro, Holderness (granted in 1761), and New Salem (1768, now Meredith) had been laid out. This gore or gap became known as Moultonboro Gore and included all of the area that would become New Hampton and Center Harbor. In 1765, the gore was renamed Moultonborough Addition and granted to Col. Jonathan Moulton by Gov. Wentworth.<sup>4</sup> At this time, however, the southern border of Center Harbor was a straight-line northeast, across the north extent of Meredith to Moultonborough. This meant that most of what is now the primary village in Center Harbor (including the site of the Pleasant View Cemetery) was actually part of New Salem/Meredith until 1873, when the town line was adjusted to put the municipal center of Center Harbor at Center Harbor Village within the boundaries of the town.

Several of the early roads through Center Harbor were laid out in the 1770s, just following this period of early settlement. In 1771, College Road was constructed to link Dartmouth College with Governor Wentworth's home in Wolfeboro.<sup>5</sup> The road headed west from Moultonborough, by the head of the bay on Winnipesaukee, then west along the approximate route of NH Route 25B to skirt the south side of Squam Lake, then north through Holderness to Ashland. Old Meredith Road (now Main Street/Coe Hill Road) was constructed to connect Meredith Bay and Center Harbor Bay in 1773. Both of these roads served as major coaching lines during this period, and are depicted on the ca. 1784 Holland Map of New Hampshire (**Figure 1**). Center Harbor Neck Road was also constructed by 1784, to connect the Sturtevant farm on the neck with what was then the primary municipal center of the town on the hilltop along what is now 25B (referred to locally as Sunset Hill) and the village along the shore of Lake Winnipesaukee (the current municipal center referred to as Center Harbor village).

The lakeside village began to grow quickly as the result of the convergence of several coaching lines, taking commerce away from the original village on Sunset Hill in the early nineteenth-century. The lakeside village was the half-way station on the once well-known Concord to Freyberg, Maine route, an 84-mile journey that was made in a single day.<sup>6</sup> The village was also the starting point for excursions by coach through the Crawford and Franconia Notches.<sup>7</sup> Eventually the municipal

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center of the town was moved down the hill to the lakeside population and trade center in ca. 1820. After steamboats reached Lake Winnipesaukee in the 1830s, the area became an even more important transportation hub: leading to a host of new hotels, boarding houses, and other ancillary construction to support the thriving industry.

It was during the beginning of this period of rapid growth for Center Harbor Village that the Lake View Cemetery was likely laid out. The oldest interment appears to be that of **Mary Preble Little**, the three-and-a-half-year-old daughter of **Charles Little** (1781-1813)<sup>8</sup> and **Eliza** (1781-1863)<sup>9</sup> who died in 1809.<sup>10</sup> Charles Little was likely the same Charles Little who was listed on the 1810 US Federal Census of Center Harbor (then in Strafford County)<sup>11</sup> as having a household of eight and who owned a store and tavern with James Little on Sunset Hill along what is now Route 25B.<sup>12</sup> Though it is possible that these people were once buried elsewhere and were moved to the Lake View Cemetery significantly after their deaths, there are no known written records to support this hypothesis. The Lake View Cemetery may have been constructed at the foot of the hill in anticipating of the primary village moving down the hillside to the shore of the Lake or it may have been laid out soon after, with graves moved from private farm cemeteries to the shore at a later date.

During the first half of the nineteenth-century, much of Center Harbor Village was owned by prominent local resident **John Coe** (1797-1861).<sup>13</sup> Born in Durham, Coe became acquainted with a gentleman who owned an unoccupied store at Center Harbor, went to Portsmouth and bought a stock of general merchandise, and returned to open a general store at Coe House (CEN0012/18 Main Street/102-060-0014) in 1820. He married **Lavinia Senter** in 1823, and returned to Durham for several years. In 1835, he returned to Center Harbor to live in his father-in-law's 1780 homestead/coaching inn (CEN0030/71 Coe Hill Road/103-032). He also purchased his father-in-law's business, the Senter House Hotel (which stood from 1830 to 1888 at the site of the Nichols Memorial Library (CEN0015/35 Plymouth St/102-002)) at around this time. On November 8, 1837, Coe donated a suitable village lot for the construction of a Congregational Church (CEN0003/52 Main Street/102-079) across the street from the Lake View Cemetery.<sup>14</sup> He also served as Center Harbor's postmaster from 1857 to 1861.<sup>15</sup> In addition to running multiple businesses, Coe was a noted abolitionist: his home is said to have been a way station on the Underground Railroad, and he traveled to the south during the Civil War to attempt to free, Richard an enslaved person who belonged to his son.<sup>16</sup>

A Congregational Church to serve both Meredith and Center Harbor had been organized in 1815, with services altering between the two communities.<sup>17</sup> The Center Harbor meetings were likely held at the East Meetinghouse, which was constructed on Sunset Hill, below the Morse Cemetery, in 1812.<sup>18</sup> After two decades of sharing a minister, the Center Harbor Congregationalists began fundraising for a new building in August of 1835. After Coe donated the land, the Greek Revival edifice was built by local men during the fall and winter of 1837 for a cost of \$1,700.<sup>19</sup> Interestingly, there is no

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known record of the Lake View cemetery ever having been associated with the neighboring Church.<sup>20</sup> By the time the Church was constructed, at least fourteen of the people interred at the cemetery had died.

The earliest known documentary evidence of the Lake View Cemetery is the 1860 Belknap County Wall Map images of Center Harbor Village (**Figure 2**).<sup>21</sup> The map clearly shows the cemetery as a square on the east side of Main Street opposite the Congregational Church. Interestingly, the map also shows the Senter House (then run by Gilman & Huntress) as several commercial blocks owned by John Coe in the small village (J. Coe's house is also identified further southwest along Old Meredith Road/Coe Hill Road in the full town within the larger county map).

Four of the men interred in the Lake View Cemetery are known to have fought in the Civil War:

- Pvt. **Elisha G. Blackey**(1833-63) lived with his parents in Moultonborough in 1850 and worked as a laborer, prior to joining the army.<sup>22</sup> He joined Company D of the 4<sup>th</sup> Regiment of New Hampshire Volunteers on August 6, 1861 in Laconia for a three year-stint and mustered in Manchester under Sgt. G. T. Ingham on September 18, 1861.<sup>23</sup> After he was injured on January 29, 1863, he was discharged from Beaufort, SC and returned to the Lakes Region.<sup>24</sup>
- Pvt. **George Haddock** (ca. 1823-71) was born in England. By 1860, he was working as a day laborer and living in Sandwich with his wife Sarah and four children.<sup>25</sup> He mustered into US Service on September 24, 1862 into Co. K of the 14<sup>th</sup> Regiment of New Hampshire Volunteers. After he was discharged from service on May 2, 1865, his family resettled in Meredith Village.<sup>26</sup> He died in Meredith of pneumonia and was interred at Lake View Cemetery.<sup>27</sup>
- Pvt. **John Emory Locke** (1840-1900)<sup>28</sup> was born in Loudon and enlisted on September 4, 1861. By the time he was hospitalized in February 1862, he was a private in the First Regiment of US Sharpshooters. By 1880, he (37) was working as a house painter and living in Center Harbor village (near the Moultonborough town line) with his wife Susan M. (35), and daughters Alice S. (10) and Grace A. (5).<sup>29</sup> By the time of his death from nephritis on October 8, 1900, Locke was serving as Postmaster for Center Harbor.<sup>30</sup>
- Dr. William Alphonso Page (1830-1917) was born in Center Harbor and went to Gilmanton Academy.<sup>31</sup> He studied medicine at Dartmouth College and practiced in Sandwich between 1855-68, before returning to Center Harbor. During the Civil War, Page served as an assistant surgeon. By 1892, he was living at his father's house on 56 Plymouth Street.<sup>32</sup>

Up until the Center Harbor town line was adjusted in 1873, the southwest portion of Main Street (including the Lake View Cemetery) actually in Meredith. From 1873 onward, the Lake View Cemetery has been located within the bounds of Center Harbor.

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The cemetery was regularly used through the 1920s.<sup>33</sup> After the Civil War, many rural communities began to establish cemetery commissions to oversee public cemetery grounds for their citizens. Prior to this date, many rural families established family plots adjacent to the family farm. Over the subsequent decades many of the rural cemeteries were abandoned, and those interred were exhumed and reinterred at publicly run cemeteries. Although Center Harbor continued to allow the creation and maintenance of private cemeteries, by the 1890s many of the family plots has been abandoned and the bodies reinterred at nearby town-run facilities (for instance, those interred at the Jackson Cemetery on Kline Road were reinterred at the Meredith Cemetery/Plymouth Street Cemetery in Meredith after a plot was purchased by the family in 1890). Center Harbor did not establish a public town cemetery until much later than the surrounding communities, and the Center Harbor Memorial Park was not established until 1970.

By the early twentieth-century, the village of Center Harbor began to change again. In 1919 the second Senter House Hotel (renamed the Colonial Inn in 1904), which stood just north of the cemetery, was destroyed by fire. The property then transferred to the Dane Family, was subdivided, and sold to the town in the early 1950s. By this time, auto-tourism and freight trucking had become more popular, and rail transportation began to lose popularity. The changing reliance on automotive transportation spurred the construction of highways, and in 1953-54 New Hampshire Route 25 was constructed between Lake Winnipesaukee and Center Harbor's Main Street, bypassing the core of the village and sandwiching the Pleasant View Cemetery between a busy motorway and the now quiet Main Street.<sup>34</sup>

#### 43. Architectural Description and Comparative Evaluation:

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery, established in ca. 1809, is located on a 0.12-acre parcel on the south side of Main Street in the primary village of Center Harbor. The cemetery is located on the side of a hill, overlooking the Center Harbor Bay of Lake Winnipesaukee. The small rectangular cemetery is laid out in five rows and surrounded by fencing with a gate at the center of the west side, opening onto Main Street. NH Route 25 is located just east of the cemetery, and was added in 1953-1954.

The cemetery faces west onto Main Street and is symmetrical in design. Remnants of an historic granite and cast-iron gate are located at the center of the west side of the cemetery and are flanked by a cast-iron fence (**photo 1**). Cast pintels in the quarry-faced granite posts indicate that the entrance once had a cast-iron gate that has been long lost. An historic cast iron fence remains along the west edge of the cemetery and is hung on plug-split granite posts. A modern wooden split-rail fence extends along the other three sides of the cemetery (**photo 2**). The date of the cast-iron fence is unknown, but was likely added to the existing cemetery around the middle of the nineteenth-century as a sign of the growing prosperity of the tourist community.<sup>35</sup>

The monuments of the Lake View Cemetery offer a wide variety of styles and materials and represent the changing tastes and styles of the nineteenth-century and are laid out in rows that parallel Main Street at the front of the cemetery. The earliest monuments are predominantly slate, with a classic "tombstone" shape, horizontal lettering, and etched urns and willows as is typical of early nineteenth-century tastes (**photos 4 & 5**). Many of the slightly later, mid-nineteenth-century monuments are marble, with curved names surrounding vital information and minimal ornamentation (**photos 6 & 7**). After the Civil War era, the monuments begin to incorporate additional flourishes, reminiscent of the aesthetic movement in art and architecture of that time (**photo 9**).

The area immediately surrounding the cemetery has changed significantly through several phases of growth and demolition since the early nineteenth-century. The cemetery stands opposite the Center Harbor Congregational Church (52 Main Street/CEN0003), which was constructed in 1837 and remodeled in 1885. During the first half of the nineteenth-century,

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the Church was the only structure immediately adjacent to the cemetery. In the 1880s, the area immediately surrounding the cemetery was developed. In 1888, the Senter House Hotel Company purchased the land north of the cemetery, and a large hotel was constructed at the approximate location of the present modern bandstand (constructed in 1998). This 3-story hotel with 91 sleeping rooms, 2 verandas, tennis courts, and a boat house (still surviving), later renamed the Colonial Inn, was destroyed by fire in 1919. The large open parking lot to the south of the Congregational Church, opposite the cemetery, was developed in ca. 1885 when the William Sheafe House was constructed at this location.<sup>36</sup>

By the 1950s, the remnants of the hotel had been demolished, and the town center embarked on a new building campaign. In 1953-54, NH Route 25 was constructed to the east of the cemetery, bisecting it from the fields that led down to the lake. In the mid-1960s, the area surrounding the former Senter House boathouse was redeveloped as a town beach. In 1965, a motel was constructed on the former Senter House property to the northeast of the cemetery (292-94 Whittier Highway). In ca. 1970, both the United States Post Office and Center Harbor Municipal Building were constructed opposite the bandstand.

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery is a well-preserved example of a rural cemetery established during the early nineteenth-century and is one of several extant cemeteries in Center Harbor. The oldest recorded cemetery in the Town is the Morse Cemetery (CEN0040/Garden Wall Lane/211-009), which was constructed in ca. 1765 adjacent to the original Center Harbor Meetinghouse in the first town center on Sunset Hill (now Route 25B/Dane Road). The Morse Cemetery is similar in use as a community burial place with stones laid out in regular rows and reflecting the changing aesthetics of the nineteenth centuries until the most recent burial in 1927. The only other community burial place in Center Harbor is the modern Center Harbor Memorial Park (Route 25B/Dane Rd/211-022) which was established in 1970 by the Town. Other family cemeteries were established throughout the town in the nineteenth-century, on the properties of the families they served. Family cemeteries within the town include the ca. 1807-1822 Sturtevant Cemetery (CEN0026/Center Harbor Neck Rd/208-009) which was removed to the Bean Cemetery in Moultonborough in ca. 1870; the ca. 1812-present Canney Hill Cemetery (CEN0035/College Rd/215-012); the ca. 1813-1965 Senter-Coe Cemetery (CEN0031/Coe Hill Rd/103-033); the ca. 1813-1955 Davis Cemetery (CEN0082/Waukewan Rd/226-009); the ca. 1825-86 Greenleaf Cemetery (CEN0057/McCrillis Hill Rd/222-028); the ca. 1835-1976 Harrison-Perkins Cemetery (CEN0090/Waukewan Rd/105-014 & 15); the ca. 1839-2011 **Hawkins Cemetery** (CEN0043/Hawkins Pond Rd/223-028); the ca. 1840-1900 **Cram** Cemetery (CEN0058/7 Piper Hill Rd/226-058); the 1841 Follet Cemetery (CEN0038/Follett Rd/216-019) which contains the single grave of D. S. Follet's daughter, Frances Caroline Follett (ca. 1835-1841); the ca. 1860 Thompson Cemetery (CEN0064/Route 25B/Dane Rd/215-010) which contains the single grave of Richard Thompson (1787-1860); the bef. 1860ca. 1890 Smith Cemetery (CEN0056/McCrillis Hill Rd/222-031); and the 1980 Rich Cemetery (131 Waukewan Rd/226-008).

#### 44. National or State Register Criteria Statement of Significance:

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery is eligible for the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places under Criterion A and Criterion C.

Criterion A: The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery qualifies for listing to the New Hampshire State Register under Criterion A for community planning and development as an example of a town cemetery whose creation reflects the broad spectrum of the community's history and culture. The early decades of the nineteenth-century were a period of rapid growth for the Town of Center Harbor as the village center shifted from Sunset Hill to the present Center Harbor Village and the economy shifted from subsistence farming to tourism associated with connecting coaching lines to the White Mountains. The formation of the Lake View/Pleasant View village cemetery at this population center provides physical evidence of this economic shift, from early settlement through the evolving sense of community.

Criterion B: The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery does not qualify for listing to the New Hampshire State Register under Criterion B. Though associated with persons of local interest, the property lacks strong associations with any persons known to have made highly significant contributions to history.

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Criterion C: The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery is individually eligible for the New Hampshire State Register under Criterion C. The cemetery design reflects the rural cemetery movement aesthetic of funerary design of the nineteenth-century. The overall layout and site topography are indicative of a rural village cemetery from this period with a convenient site near the village center and elevated view site. The layout of the plots, decorative fence and diverse styles of grave markers and headstones and method and material of construction represent many character-defining features of vernacular cemeteries of this period.

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery is not part of any potential historic district due to lack of neighborhood integrity. The immediate area surrounding the cemetery has changed drastically throughout the modern period. When it was constructed, the Cemetery was at the edge of a growing village center, with a grand hotel constructed shortly thereafter to the east and several large ornate dwellings to the northwest and along what is now NH Route 25 south toward Meredith. The adjacent Hotel was destroyed by fire in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, the setting of the village core altered significantly by the construction of NH Route 25 in the 1950s, and then many adjacent historic buildings destroyed to make way for modern municipal structures and parking lots in the second-half of the twentieth-century.

#### 46. Statement of Integrity:

The Lake View/Pleasant View Cemetery retains integrity of location, design, workmanship, feeling and association. The establishment of NH Route 25 between the cemetery and the Lake, and the modern changes to the area immediately surrounding the cemetery have led to a partial loss of integrity of setting. The loss of some of the historic cast-iron fencing and the extreme deterioration of some of the historic monuments has led to some loss of integrity of materials. The overall location, design, materials, feeling and association remain wholly intact, however, and the small cemetery offers a strong memorial to the history of the town's development and the lives of the early villagers.

#### 47. Boundary Discussion:

The boundary of the survey area was limited to the current tax parcel (Map 102-077). The current tax parcel is bounded to the west by Main Street and the opposite Center Harbor Congregational Church (52 Main Street/Map 102-079). To the south is a small undeveloped Town-owned parcel (102-078). To the east the cemetery is bounded by Route 25, and to the north it is bound by the Town Bandstand (102-076). The current parcel is defined by the fence-line of the cemetery, and appears to have remained unchanged since at least 1900.




Figure 2: Center Harbor in 1860




Figure 3: Center Harbor in 1892


